A training school pivoting on affairs of Care and Improvisation. Recent history, from COVID through climate change, massive displacements of people, a worrying increase in various forms of totalitarianism, unjust wars the rapid rise of neo-liberalism (one can easily multiply this list) has both placed a greater focus on, and need for, care, and at the same time radically reduced the structures from which care often operates. As traditional institutions of care are denuded of resources, and governments implement policies that make care simultaneously more difficult to enact, yet that much more needed, it is fair to say we are facing a crisis of care. How can art and artists implement care in their practices? How should society care for artists, and artists for each other, and how can art itself be a tool for care and how should artists interact with communities in caring ways? Given improvisation's ability to creatively and imaginatively find ways to modify existing structures, subvert norms and implement new forms of sociality, do we perhaps now more than ever need to improvise new models of care?

Under these premises, we invite papers, panels, performances, concert proposals, workshops, seminars, poster presentations, artistic submissions, artist talks, installations, and other interventions that address research and creative practice at the intersection of Care and Improvisation and vis-á-vis (not restrictive list):

The open call is directed to artists, scholars, philosophers, scientists, policy makers, lobbyists, designers, and creative practitioners. Please submit a 250-word description/abstract (including, if relevant, images or links to video/audio) for your proposed intervention/presentation. Use the PDF-file format for submission and render your text completely anonymous to allow for blind refereeing.
